Introduction

We are deliberate in our efforts to live our school vision and mission as we strive to build connections to **Powerful Learning**. Enhanced student and staff learning emerge because of these intentional connections. We aim to cultivate a passion for learning in both the school and the **community** within an **inclusive**, **collaborative thinking culture**. Our staff, students, families and the community work together to support students in being **passionate learners** within our school, local community and beyond. This has become an effective method to share our story with families and the community.

The school is committed to using the results in this report to improve achievement for students. Results are used to develop effective strategies for our Three Year Education Plan ensuring that all Westmount students acquire knowledge, skills and attitudes they need to be connected, responsible, caring and contributing members of society.



Westmount Elementary School Council (WESC)

Westmount School has an active and effective School Council that meets bi-monthly throughout the school year. This partnership has resulted in increased opportunities for our students and has fostered a strong, positive relationship between families and our school. WESC has a voice in budgeting, school activities and programming. The relationship between Westmount School and WESC has been integral in building a sense of community.

School Profile

Westmount School is a Kindergarten to Grade 6 school that has a current student population of just under 400. Our programming includes two full time kindergarten classes with the option for regular kindergarten embedded. This provides our families with the opportunity to choose the program that best meets their needs. Throughout Grades 1 to 6, we have either

2 or 3 classes at each grade level. Additionally, we have Music and Physical Education programs taught by specialists. Our Hockey Program, for interested Grade 5 and 6 students, has grown and would be in its 9th year. At this time, our hockey program is on hold due to Covid. Our Strive program serves children with varying educational challenges. Each of these students is provided with individualized programming to meet diverse academic, social and behavioural needs.

Revenues and Expenditures

Our school enrollment has stayed relatively constant in the last 3 years which allows us to work with a comparable budget. The percentage of funds allocated to each category has also remained similar.






Comment on Results:

Students Model the Characteristics of Active Citizenship Strategies:

- Identify competencies, attitudes and behaviours essential for success as an engaged citizen and communicate to families how these are taught through conversations, modelling and social media.
- Celebrate successes through assemblies, social media, phone calls and emails. Continue to 'tell our story' to each other, our families and the community.
- Our drama production is a cross-graded, whole school collaborative endeavour in which ALL of our staff and students will play key roles. Students will take on roles that mirror occupations such as set design, make up artists, costume design, marketing and advertising, media, sound, etc.
- Grade 6 Student Government, a group of elected Grade 6 students, is building skills of citizenship and volunteerism while becoming strong leaders in our school.
- Westmount Chief & Council and the Tribal Advisory Committee take on a leadership role with Matapiiks (Native Club).
- We focus on environmental stewardship. This is reflected in classroom activities, monthly assemblies and school-wide recycling initiatives.
- Purposefully help students and families understand the relationship between employment preparation and citizenship activities such as safety patrol, hall monitors, extra-curricular activities, service projects and volunteerism.
- Continue to engage in, support and promote (social media) Roots of Empathy Program and Junior Achievement.
- Grade 5 and 6 students host a Christmas Marketplace. Students design a business plan, create product and sell it to our school community. Funds raised are donated to organizations decided by students. In this way, our students get a taste of what it is like to be a businessperson.
- Continue to develop our virtue program around the school vision and mission and the core values of responsibility, respect, collaboration, empathy and perseverance.
- Circle of Excellence, which is held every second month and is a direct reflection of our motto 'Effort Today, Excellence Tomorrow', celebrates individual achievement with families.
- Makerspace, which occurs on Fridays in the library, provides students with the opportunity to explore an ever-changing assortment of activities that involve designing, building and creating.
- Clubs Encouraging Active Citizenship:
 - DIY Club, run by our librarian, has students and outside experts learning together. Topics are identified based on student interest.
 - Sign Language Club, run by a trained Educational Assistant, provides students with the opportunity to learn the basics of sign language. O' Canada is signed at all assemblies.
 - Kindness Club is a multi-grade club dedicated to spreading kindness. This is intentionally linked with our Family School Community Resource Worker to build citizenship skills in students.

Gardening Club is also a multi-grade club dedicated to learning about gardening and

carina for our flower beds.







First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students in Alberta are successful.

Comment on Results:

We plan for continued positive academic shift in the academic success of our First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students through building relationships and providing educational and cultural support. This is an ongoing focus starting in early grades to build capacity in our First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students. Fostering relationships and celebrating successes allows us to build understanding and continue to grow and learn alongside our Siksika students and their community.

Strategies:

- For the 2020 21 school year, we have a full-time Siksika liaison who works with students academically and culturally. This role is designed to provide our First Nations, Métis and Inuit students with ongoing support, positive relationships and strong connections to culture.
 - One goal we have set out for our Siksika liaison is to build relationships and connections
 that encourage cultural understanding and celebration among all of our students. With
 these relationships, we endeavour to foster self-confidence and further develop successful
 learners.
 - Westmount School strives to be inclusive in all that we do. All students participate in activities that promote Blackfoot culture.
- First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students have access to learning supports including Emerging Readers, Early Literacy and Numeracy and Family School Community Resource Program.
- Miss Westmount School represents Westmount School at Powwows throughout the year.
- Westmount School's Chief & Council takes a school leadership role alongside our Grade 6 Student Government.

Comment on Results:

Intentional planning and budgeting provides us with multiple opportunities to build a safe and caring community for all of our students while maintaining high academic expectations. Staff recognize the value of building positive relationships with their students and work diligently at building and maintaining these relationships with students and their families. - o To ensure a positive learning environment for all students, we have a collaborative approach with students, families and staff. We are community focused.
- We continue to have all grade five students involved in the Roots of Empathy Program.
- Buddy connections between classes create learning opportunities and promote awareness and empathy for all ages.
- Teachers access support from Instructional Coaches to implement differentiation strategies and assistive technology to ensure all students are successful in the classroom.
- Our Strive program is designed to meet the diverse needs of our learners while also being inclusive.
 Students work on individualized goals independently, in small groups and within classroom settings.
 Inclusion is the ultimate goal for all our students.
- Our Resource Team meets weekly to explore opportunities and supports needed for students to reach their full potential. This is a highly collaborative approach and relies on the strengths of all staff and school partners.
- Continue to communicate with families and the community about Westmount School, upcoming events and its students' accomplishments. This is done through our website, social media, weekly emails from teachers and our bi-monthly school newsletter.
- o Most classrooms use Seesaw or Fresh Grade (online portfolios) to encourage and allow students to share their learning with an authentic audience (their families).
- We "Tell our Story" and celebrate successes through social media (Facebook and Instagram) ensuring that what we do connects to our vision and mission.

o Teaching staff are always a part of the decision-making process regarding programs and options available at Westmount School. These decisions take place during monthly

staff meetings and at our yearly planning session in May.

To ensure that families engage with our school, we aim to offer multiple opportunities for them to provide input and hear directly from administration and teaching staff. This is done through the following strategies:

- Encourage parental input in regards to their child's Individual Program Plan.
- o Foster the positive relationship we have with our School Council.
- Improve our school newsletter ~ interesting, informative, easy to read
- Our student government enables our student population to maintain a direct line of communication to the school administration. This is vital in maintaining a positive school culture.
